MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Dear Parents, Carers,



The Easter break seems like a long time ago now, and the focus for this term is examinations, both internal trial exams for our Year 12 students, and public exams for students in Year 11 and 13. Like many schools it has been three years since we've held public examinations due to the pandemic. The MFL speaking exams started this week, and our Year 12 students (who started their examinations on Thursday 5 May) will be on study leave until Friday 13 May. Our Year 11 and Year 13

students will begin their exams on Monday 16 May. Year 11 students will start their study leave at the end of the school day on Friday 13 May and Year 13 will follow on Friday 20 May 2022.

I'm sure that they have been working hard on their revision, and I wish them every success.

Our school day trips have returned, and you'll find details of the student experiences in the VIP and on our school Twitter page. We will be looking at the return of residential trips for the next academic year. Whilst this may be disappointing for some to hear, this is mainly due to the restrictions in place and the staffing implications: risk assessments need to be carried and the required resources to keep the school running. We will send you more information once we have finalised the details.







In previous VIP editions, we touched on our community awareness with students fundraising for charities. Our students are also encouraged to be aware of their environment, whether they are recycling, upcycling or learning about food wastage like our KS3 Eco club has recently.

Earlier this year we mentioned the football success of one of our Year 12 students who was selected for the England U18s and experienced what it was like to play for his country at international level. There is an article included in this VIP.

Please note that from Monday 9th May 2022, our West Gate will no longer be open for students to enter or leave school for safeguarding reasons. Students must come into East Gate (main school entrance) and 6th Formers must continue to sign in and out when they leave the premises.

We welcomed Ofsted into school on the 4th and 5th May and will share the findings once we are allowed to. The report has to be quality assured and factually correct before it is publicly released.

Finally, congratulations to our Year 11 Basketball Team for winning their final game against Folkestone this morning.

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






YEAR 9 MANDARIN EXCELLENCE PROGRAMME




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FRIENDSHIP BENCHES


