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Coronavirus (COVID-19) - updates from the Headteacher

We welcomed both Year 10 and Year 12 this week in smaller numbers – 25% of the combined year groups each day, around 140 students and I can report that our uptake was around 80% meaning that four in every five attended which is a fantastic effort. I did note the joyous faces of parents who were dropping their children off – even if it was only for a 3 hour break.

I am very grateful to Mrs Walker and her Facilities Team who have prepared the whole School site in readiness for staff and some students to return. They have peppered the site with little footprints to follow, rolls of hazard tape, clear directional routes and made each area as safe as is possible with sanitisers outside and inside classrooms, wipes inside the room and only the necessary desks required. A mammoth effort which needs to be maintained each day so that rooms are ready and I do think our students appreciated the opportunity to be back in familiar surroundings amongst their peers with staff who they get on well with.

Year 10 will follow the same subjects on the same day of the week as the one just finished although I have changed the order as some staff noticed that some students were quite fatigued by the last session because of the high-impact lessons delivered every 30-minutes. I managed to deliver the 3 lessons of Mathematics set for the week in my 30 minutes but I felt, by the end of it, quite tired!

Year 12 sessions continue with Group 3 on Monday/Tuesday and Group 4 on Thursday/Friday. Please stick to your groups, refer to your old timetable of when subjects where taught and also note that there are no directed study facilities on site. You are only supposed to in school when you have a taught lesson. The site is as safe as can be but we are only allowing those that need to be on-site, on-site.

Temperature Screening

As a reassurance for all staff and students coming into school, we have installed a new 'temperature screening' machine next to the Millennium entrance. The temperature screening machine gives an accurate reading of your current temperature and anyone with a reading of over 37.9 will be asked to move away and after a minute, retake their temperature. If it remains above 37.9, if a member of staff, we would ask them to leave the site immediately and book themselves in for a Covid-19 test. If a student, records a reading above 37.9, they will be escorted to the Medical Room where they will remain, whilst being monitored on CCTV, until their parents can arrive to remove them from the site. Again, they would be asked to arrange for a test to the taken and to report the result to us at their very earliest convenience.

Should a member of staff or student have a reading of above 37.9, an alert will sound both at the unit and remotely to alert a member of staff who will make their way down to the console to assist.

We understand that recording a temperature of above 37.9 does not necessarily mean that they have contracted Covid-19 but, as it is a possible indicator, we would ask that a test is undertaken.



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More and more staff continue to use TEAMS, ZOOM or YOUTUBE during their lessons, but please understand that some staff still do not feel comfortable in using these platforms and I would ask that students and parents do not put pressure on them to do so.

However, as we said last week that we have listened to staff, students and parents and have now decided that although the default setting is that the cameras are off, members of staff at their own discretion can leave student cameras on.

Could we therefore ask your son or daughter that they are suitably dressed, in a suitable location in the house with no identifiable personal information in shot. As said above, we are actively encouraging staff to use a variety of ways of delivering information. Please also keep an eye out for any additional information that we send to you regarding the safeguarding advice around platforms like Zoom and would be grateful if you could speak to your son or daughter about these.

Thought For The Week

"British Values"

The five British Values are democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, and mutual respect for and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs and for those without faith. These are the five fundamental values that have been developed by the UK Government in an attempt to create social unity and prevent extremism. The Government guidance on the implementation of the fundamental values framework provides both examples of what students should know, and what to teach.

Examples of what students should know include:

- How to influence society through lawful democratic participation;
- That the freedom to religion, including the freedom of others to hold faiths other than your own, is enshrined in British law;
- That people of diverse faiths should all be respected and not be discriminated against as a result of their religious affiliations;
- That it is everyone's responsibility to identify and challenge discrimination wherever it occurs.

Examples of teaching strategies include:

- A critical analysis of democracy, its strengths and weaknesses, and how it contrasts to other forms of governance;
- Implementation of small-scale democratic processes within schools that focus on childhood citizenship. This might include allowing students to have a voice on matters of importance to them and how their school is run;
- Hold mock elections, including mock election debates, through which students can voice their differences of opinion in respectful and tolerant ways.









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This Week's PHSCE Theme

"Learning to Learn". Last week we explored the principle of life-long learning and how we acquire knowledge throughout our lives. This time we focus upon how we learn — are you someone that forever makes notes, spider diagrams that link ideas and concepts or are you a person that learns through practicalities where experiential learning is the main methodology? Do you use a mixture of both? It is a fact that many people do not see the link between school and employment but if you break it down without the detail, a link can be established. Each subject at school requires you to learn and process a body of knowledge, it's not important what the knowledge is but embedding skills of how you use the knowledge that you acquire is. At work you process a body of knowledge and skills related to the employment which is kind of what you do in school.

How do you use the knowledge that you have acquired? Think about three subjects that you currently study — say Mathematics, Art and Geography. What is similar in how you learn them and what is different? Think of three professions — say Police Officer, Bus Driver and Construction Worker, what body of knowledge is there for them to learn, how do they learn the skills and how similar or different is it to what you do in school? If you are able to establish how you learn best, you would be able to maximise your learning opportunities in the future.






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MyBnk - Online Money Twist - Years 7-9
