

During the October Half, some of our Spanish students had the wonderful opportunity to visit Andalusia, Spain. After A short and sweet flight later, we touched down in Spain and arrived at our hotel. Team Beths stocked up on lunch ahead of their first excursion.





Our first stop was the nearby Sea Life Aquarium. We were given a guided tour and introduced to sharks, seahorses, and a very large turtle. However, the stars of the show were the family of otters.












Not only were we treated to a paella-making demonstration, but volunteers also had the opportunity to assist in preparing this traditional and ancient Spanish dish. ¡Tan delicioso!







We began our first full day with a trip to the Alcázar of Seville, a historic palace filled with treasures, including stunning rooms, ducks, and peacocks.



After visiting the palace, we climbed the Giralda—all 36 floors (70 metres) of it! The Giralda is the bell tower of Seville Cathedral. We were very lucky to be at the top when the bells rang!



We made a quick stop for lunch—good food, great company, and beautiful surroundings.













We set off early to visit the iconic palace and fortress. Not only was it one of the world's wonders, but it was also a stunning example of Islamic architecture and one of the best-preserved palaces from the historic Christian and Islamic worlds. The students explored how the complex incorporated elements of Spanish Renaissance architecture.



After a stroll through Granada, we visited not one but two stunning cathedrals. We were fortunate to see the resting places of the iconic Spanish monarchs Isabella of Castile and Ferdinand of Aragon, as well as Philip the Handsome and Juana, another Spanish queen.





We were treated to a fabulous flamenco show by a local group. They explained that flamenco's origins could be traced to the gitanos of China, Africa, South America, the Islamic world, and Europe. Although several members of our group were eager to volunteer their skills (some had even brought their own castanets and fans), we left it to the

professionals!





We took advantage of some free time that evening to walk along the pier and enjoy some ice cream. After dinner, the students used their

remaining energy in the hotel games room.





Happy birthday to our quinceañero, Tobi! As well as spending his special day in Málaga, we celebrated at dinner tonight with tapas, cake, and party hats. Mr. Timothy, whose birthday was on Friday, also received a shout-out!



Our last day was spent in Málaga. We began by climbing the majestic Gibralfaro Castle. From its walls, we surveyed the whole of Málaga.







Once dropped off in central Málaga, the students indulged in some retail therapy (parents and friends can look forward to their gifts!), stopped by the house of Málaga's most iconic resident, Pablo Picasso, and visited the impressive Málaga Cathedral.



Football and tapas made for the perfect end to our last day. The students played football and volleyball, read, or chatted on the nearby beach before heading to a local restaurant for tapas. We were treated to a stream of delicious, traditional tapas dishes.

TREE PLANTING

An investment in all our futures.

This week saw our Year 7 and 8 students each pot their own tree, creating Beths Grammar School's very first tree nursery.

Saplings, sourced from seeds collected and stored in the UK and Ireland to minimise the risk of importing invasive pests and diseases and to keep their carbon footprint to a minimum, were potted into reused pop bottles, underlining our commitment to reuse and repurposing of plastics.

Our trees have been chosen as a mix of fruit and nut species: elder, rowan, hazel, blackthorn, crab apple and dog rose especially for the range of wildlife they will support.

Elder is a small tree, popular for gardens. The fragrant flowers appear in May and June and can be used to make elderflower cordial. Rowan berries, which the tree produces in autumn, can be used to make jams and jellies. Hazel trees provide hazelnuts during the autumn months, best picked in September and October. Blackthorn trees produce purple fruits called sloes, which can be used to make sloe gin, cordial and even jam. Crab apple trees provide small, sour crab apples which can be turned into jelly. The dog rose produces edible fruits called rose hips, which can be used to make syrups, jellies and teas.









TREE PLANTING

When full, our tree nursery will accommodate 1000 trees and will produce the equivalent amount of oxygen needed for everyone on site. Our trees will be used in community planting projects in the boroughs around the school.

This is the first student-led sustainability activity of the year and the first of a series of school-wide projects driven by our new Sustainability Lead, Mr Martin and supported by our Key Stage 4 Eco-Club.









CHINESE CLUB

Chinese paper-cutting is one of the traditional folk arts in China. It is the art of cutting paper into different shapes.

During Chinese experience club, students learned about the history and culture of Chinese paper-cutting and had the opportunity to try cutting out various shapes and designs. They successfully created impressive paper-cutting artworks.
