## ONCE UPON A TIME... IN HOLLYWOOD: REVIEW

Once Upon a Time... in Hollywood is a comedy-drama/Western motion picture released in 2019, directed and written by the renowned Quentin Tarantino. It follows the lives of Rick Dalton (played by Leonardo DiCaprio), Cliff Booth (Brad Pitt), and Sharon Tate (Margot Robbie). Upon its release, it received favourable reviews from critics, averaging a score of 4/5 stars across rating platforms and 80/100 (by averages) through review-based websites.

Having watched the film a few years ago, I decided to revisit it recently, inspired by the resurgence of Tarantino's filmography across social media. I vividly remembered it was not only a good movie but a *great* one; and yet, once again, Tarantino blew my expectations out of the water. *Once Upon a Time... in Hollywood* is, to me, his best work (both objectively and subjectively). Fusing together elements of historical accuracy and creativity, the bending of life and death through the twisting of fates (such as Tate's), and encapsulating it in stunning cinematography and never-lacking pacing, the movie plays directly into Tarantino's strengths and revered attributes: memorability and the defamiliarisation of historical events.

One of the most interesting aspects of the film that only became prevalent upon my re-watch, however, is the cast. Obviously, it is stacked - you have some of Hollywood's biggest names (such as DiCaprio and Pitt) running the show. But, almost uncannily, the supporting cast has proven to become some of Hollywood's most promising future names also. For instance, one of the 'Manson girls' was played by Mikey Madison, the winner of the Oscar for Best Actress at this year's Academy Awards. *Once Upon a Time... in Hollywood* thus seems to be emblematic of the acting industry's top dogs currently; even if some of those 'top dog' statuses are still pending.

Whilst the overall plot of the movie lacks cohesion and is therefore practically unexplainable here, each segment is intricately woven together with the next, crafting an engaging narrative structure that does not rely on action-driven sequences but rather the idea of the film itself. Because of this - because of the very execution of the movie's concept and fulfilled reliance upon itself for its own intrigue - I would give *Once Upon a Time... in Hollywood* a solid 4.5/5 stars. It remains my favourite Tarantino project to date, and I strongly urge anybody who has not watched it to check it out (especially if you are into motion pictures that blend genres in a simultaneously nostalgic yet innovative way!)






# CHOOSING YOUR GCSE OPTIONS


Currently in Year 9 at Beths we have just had the fantastic opportunity to pick our GCSE options for the subjects we will study for the next two years. In line with the government's recommendations under the English Baccalaureate (EBacc), which is a set of subjects at GCSE that keep young people's options open for further study and future careers. They encourage students to take English Literature and Language, Maths, The Sciences, (which are all mandatory at Beths) and Geography or History, and a Language. At Beths, we are fortunate to have a variety of subjects, from Modern Foreign Languages like German, Italian, Mandarin, to Humanities like RE, History, and Geography, to the Arts like Music and Drama, and to subjects that you won't have done in Key Stage 3 like Psychology, Economics and Engineering.



#### How does the Option Process work?

For this year's options, there are up to 24 subjects that you can choose from which you will commit to for 2 years until Year 11 when you sit your GCSE examinations. In addition to the 6 compulsory subjects mentioned above, students choose 4 options subjects from the 24 available. With your 4 options, you also need to pick a reserve which will be the subject the school could offer you, if for any circumstances they cannot fulfil one of your 4 choices, but this is very unlikely. There are many events, and assemblies that lead up to the Option Selection Process being the release of the Options Booklet, a Year 9 assembly informing us on our GCSE options and the factors we should consider, an options information evening informing our parents about the process and lastly the Options Choice deadline being on the 2nd May 2025 this year.

To summarise, Selecting your GCSE courses is a crucial decision that will influence your future academic and professional trajectory. Even though it could feel overwhelming, thinking about your long-term objectives, interests, and strengths can help you make wise decisions. Keep in mind that you should not be influenced by your peers; selecting topics that interest you is what really counts. Ask for guidance, maintain your curiosity, and have faith that you're positioning yourself for success by making smart decisions.



Take note of this when you have made your preliminary choices:

#### 1. Have you a definite career in mind? YES / NO

What is the career? What GCSE grades are required? (the Careers Section within the LRC can help you find out)

#### 2. Will the choice made preclude you from any particular career? YES / NO

The Careers Team can offer you advice and materials relating to University and other sixth form options.

#### 3. Do your parents agree with your preferences? YES / NO

### 4. Are subject teachers sure that you can achieve at least a Grade 6 at GCSE in these subjects?

Is your current Key Stage 3 Attainment at least Grade 4? Remember these are your preferred subjects – they should enable you to achieve your best grades.

III NASCAR CUP SERIES

Greetings, readers! I hope you've had a good and restful Easter holiday as under one-third of this academic year remains. I am Faeq <u>(pronounced: *Fi-eek*)</u> of 9B, and despite now becoming the *editor* of Best of the Beths, I will continue to produce articles for you! This month, my focus shifts back to the NASCAR Cup Series, and by the time you would've read this (at least) nine of the 36 points races this year would've gone by. So what exactly has happened since my season preview back in January? Here's your opportunity to find out as I briefly recap the opening quarter of the 2025 NASCAR Cup Series season! **U** 

#### \*Round 1: The 2025 Daytona 500

45 teams entered this year's Daytona 500, but 41 of them qualified for the main event. The big names of the Cup Series would be joined by the likes of 4-time Indianapolis 500 winner Hélio Castroneves [#91 Trackhouse Racing] and Martin Truex Jr. [#56 TRICON Garage], who retired from full-time competition at the end of 2024. William Byron [#24 Hendrick Motorsports] eventually won his second consecutive Daytona 500 after avoiding a last-lap crash that involved many of the leaders. Perhaps surprisingly, 7-time champion and now part-time driver Jimmie Johnson [#84 Legacy Motor Club] came home 3<sup>rd</sup>. This therefore marked his best result in the '500 since winning it for a second time in 2013, as well as his first top-5 finish in a Cup race since 2020 - among other things!

#### \*Rounds 2-3: Atlanta 1 and Circuit of the Americas

A week after the Daytona 500 came the first Atlanta race of 2025. This was forced into Overtime following a late caution, and Christopher Bell [#20 Joe Gibbs Racing] would win after being ahead of Carson Hocevar [#77 Spire Motorsports] and Kyle Larson [#5 Hendrick Motorsports] at the last moment of caution. The Circuit of the Americas played host to Round 3, and this was the first road-course race of the season (where the drivers would turn left *and* right). In the first race with the new track layout, Christopher Bell would pass Kyle Busch [#8 Richard Childress Racing] for the lead with 5 laps to go and hold on to score the win in Austin (Texas' capital city), as well as back-to-back victories.

#### <u>\*Rounds 4-5: Phoenix 1 and Las Vegas 1</u>

Phoenix was next, and this race saw the use of two tyre compounds: the prime tyre (slower yet longer-lasting) and the option tyre (quicker but faster-wearing). In a race where the option tyre was a powerful strategic weapon, Christopher Bell [#20 Joe Gibbs Racing] edged out his teammate Denny Hamlin [#11] for his third consecutive Cup Series victory. Las Vegas Motor Speedway was the venue for Round 5, and Josh Berry [#21 Wood Brothers Racing] scored his first-career Cup Series win in only his fifth race with his new team. He cleared Daniel Suárez [#99 Trackhouse Racing] for the lead on Lap 254 following a late-race restart, before eventually winning by 1.358 seconds.

#### \*Rounds 6-7: Homestead-Miami and Martinsville 1



Homestead-Miami Speedway hosted Round 6, and Ryan Blaney [#12 Team Penske] suffered a blown engine after being the day's dominant driver. Alex Bowman [#48 Hendrick Motorsports] then hit the wall in turns 3 and 4 while leading with just 7 laps to go; his teammate Kyle Larson [#5] immediately took advantage for his 30<sup>th</sup> career win and first of 2025. The seventh round took place at Martinsville, and Denny Hamlin [#11 Joe Gibbs Racing] dominated by leading 274 of the 400 laps for his first Martinsville win since 2015. Post-race, Erik Jones' [#43 Legacy Motor Club] Toyota was *disqualified* for failing to meet minimum weight requirements, therefore making it the first disqualification of 2025.

**III NASCAR** CUP SERIES

#### \*Rounds 8-9: Darlington 1 and Bristol 1

Darlington Raceway was host to not only Round 8, but also NASCAR's annual Throwback Weekend. Despite William Byron [#24 Hendrick Motorsports] winning both Stages and leading the first 243 of 297 eventual laps, Denny Hamlin [#11 Joe Gibbs Racing] took his second straight win through Overtime as Byron finished 2<sup>nd</sup>. The Cup Series then went to Bristol for Round 9, and Kyle Larson [#5 Hendrick Motorsports] posted the most dominant performance thus far in 2025. He won both Stages and led 411 of the 500 laps to claim his 25<sup>th</sup> win with HMS. Larson dedicated the win to Hendrick's late Jon Edwards, a PR representative in NASCAR since 1994 - Edwards died suddenly on the Thursday before the race.

**\*Now, who are the Championship favourites at this stage of the season?** I may have just recapped the first nine races of the season, but I'm not done yet! Back in January, I wondered if **Team Penske** could be stopped this season, owing to them having won *the last three* Cup Series Championships. Well, Joe Glbbs **Racing** can do it. They've definitely started strong in 2025, with wins in five of the first nine contests. Hendrick Motorsports, however, have arguably been more consistent than JGR. Hendrick have all four drivers in the top-10 in points (after Round 9), and all four were even in the *top-6* from Las Vegas to Martinsville. HMS have also had at least one car finish in the top-5 in *every race* thus far, making them the only organisation to achieve such a feat at this stage in 2025.

In terms of the drivers, Kyle Larson [#5 Hendrick Motorsports] sits as the outright odds-on title favourite after the ninth race of the season. His title chances after Bristol are the highest anyone's have ever been this year; Larson has an implied chance of **25.00%** to win his second-career NASCAR Cup Series Championship. There are other contenders though, like Christopher Bell [#20 Joe Gibbs Racing], who won three consecutive races, and Larson's teammate William Byron [#24], who has led the points standings since Round 3. So where (roughly) do they stand among the others? On the next page are the title odds, supplied by DraftKings Sportsbook at the conclusion of the first quarter! **•**
