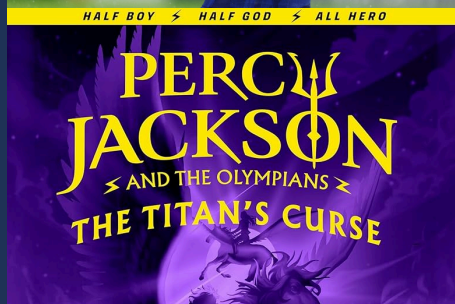

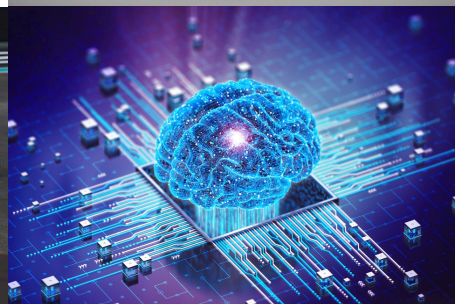

# PERCY JACKSON: BOOK SERIES REVIEW



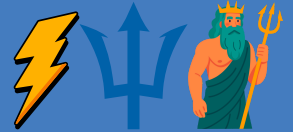

Whether you are an adult at home or a student in school, books about Greek mythology are always entertaining for you to read at home. They can improve your emotional awareness, your courage and determination and just good knowledge about Greek myths! So grab one of these books and start reading right away !

## Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief

A kid named Percy Jackson or *Perseus Jackson* (named after the Greek hero *Perseus*) thinks he is an ordinary kid when his best friend Grover reveals himself as a satyr and he soon realizes that he is the son of one of the Greek gods... *Poseidon*. He then makes a few new friends (although some aren't that nice) in his new demigod camp. A son of the god *Hermes* called Luke (who turns out to be a traitor) and a daughter of *Athena* called Annabeth. Percy, Annabeth and Grover all venture together to retrieve the lightning bolt of *Zeus* (the lord of the skies) while Luke tries to steal it back before Percy and his crew find it. Who will get to it first?



## Percy Jackson and the Sea of Monsters

Percy Jackson realizes that he has another "brother" called Tyson but he is a *cyclops* but still another son of *Poseidon*. A bully in his camp called Clarisse who is a daughter of the god *Ares*, got chosen to go on a "quest" to save Percy's friend - Grover from a hungry Cyclops called *Polyphemus*. Percy, Annabeth and Tyson sneak out of Camp Half- Blood to help Clarisse and find Grover. But what about *Polyphemus*? Will he see the heroes sneaking in his cave or not?



## Percy Jackson and the Titan's Curse

Percy Jackson meets someone else in the midst of summer in Camp Half-Blood.. It's a daughter of *Zeus* named Thalia. ## Percy Jackson and the Battle of the Labyrinth

Percy, Grover, Annabeth and Tyson all travel together into the labyrinth to find the Greek god *Daedalus* to destroy the Labyrinth entrance in their camp so that they can stop Kronos's army from invading Camp Half - Blood. 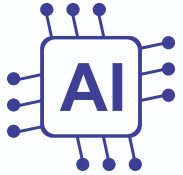

## Advantages

# THE ASHES



## The History of the Ashes Cricket Series and the Current 2025 Contest

As many cricket fans may know, the Ashes are one of the most iconic and fiercely contested rivalries in world cricket and even have a long history dating back to over 140 years! It's a series not only for the players to remember but also the fans of both sides.

### What are The Ashes?

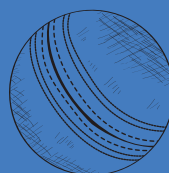
If you're still wondering what the Ashes are all about, here's a quick overview. The Ashes are a five match Test series between England and Australia, which are held every two years approximately. These matches take place over five days each, with both teams competing to win the most matches overall. The series alternates between England and Australia, so fans in both countries get a chance to see the action. Famous grounds in which they are held include: Lord's, The Oval, Edgbaston, Headingley, and Old Trafford in England, and The Gabba (Brisbane), Adelaide Oval, MCG (Melbourne), Sydney Cricket Ground (SCG), and Perth Stadium in Australia.

### The Origin of the Ashes

The origin of the Ashes dates back to 1882, during a time when England's cricket team was at its best. However, in that year, Australia achieved a historic victory over England at The Oval, in London, which shocked the cricketing world. This unexpected loss was a huge blow to England's pride, and it was said that England's cricketing reputation had been "burnt to ashes."

Following this loss, a satirical obituary was published in The Sporting Times, a British newspaper, declaring that English cricket had died, and "the body will be cremated and the ashes taken to Australia." This humorous remark quickly caught to the public. A few weeks later, when the English team travelled to Australia for a return series, the English captain Ivo Bligh was presented with a small urn. The urn, made of terracotta, was said to contain the ashes of a bail which is the piece of equipment at the top of a wicket that falls off when the stumps are hit. It was humorously suggested that this urn symbolized the "Ashes" of English cricket when it had died.

While the urn itself was not originally the official trophy, it became a symbol of the two teams. The term "The Ashes" stuck, and since then, the Ashes series has become one of the most anticipated events in the cricketing calendar.



## **The 2025-2026 Ashes Series**

As of when I'm writing this, the 2025-26 Ashes series is rapidly building towards a decisive phase as England and Australia contest the third Test at Adelaide Oval. Australia, the defending holders, have taken early control of the five-match series and now hold a commanding 2-0 lead. For England, the Adelaide Test represents a highly important moment: win to keep the series alive, or risk losing the Ashes before Christmas.

Australia set the tone early in the series with a dominant performance in the opening Test, where their pace attack from Mitchell Starc and middle-order batting proved too strong for the tourists England. They followed that up with another convincing victory in the second Test, exposing England's difficulties in adapting to Australian conditions. Despite moments of resistance, which include Joe Root's first Century in Australia, England have struggled for consistency with both bat and ball.

Attention has now shifted to Adelaide, traditionally one of Australia's most successful venues. The hosts have strengthened their side with the return of captain Pat Cummins and great spinner Nathan Lyon, adding even more power to the line-up. However, the removal of Usman Khawaja has concerned people, showing a significant selection call as Australia look to secure the series as quickly as possible.

England, meanwhile, have been forced into changes of their own. Seeking greater penetration from their bowling attack, the selectors have turned to Josh Tongue, hoping his bowling can get them wickets. The pressure on England's batters is also large, with the side needing a big first-innings performance to compete on a pitch expected to be better for bowlers.

With Australia able to retain the Ashes with only a draw, the contest is in their favour. Yet England have built their cricketing identity on bouncing back and a victory in Adelaide would give them hope as the series moves towards Melbourne and Sydney. Having said all of this, it's definitely going to be interesting to watch so be sure to watch a few highlights! Thanks for reading and I hope to see you in the New Year.

# THE FINAL SETTLED FORM DEBATE



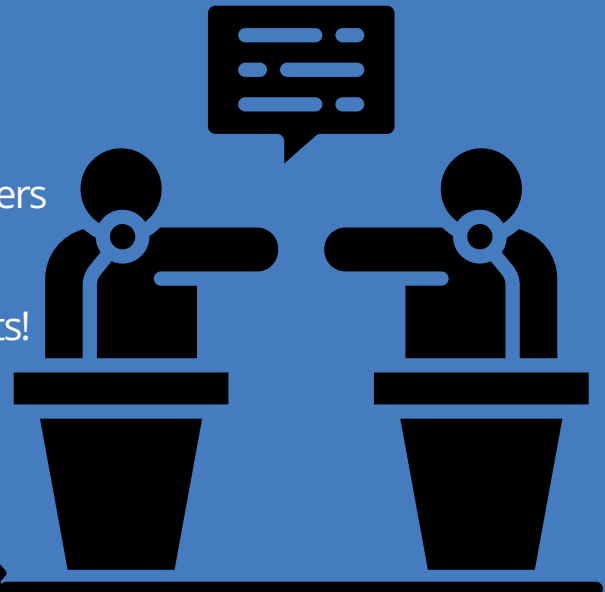

# PARKWAY DRIVE - HORIZONS: REVIEW

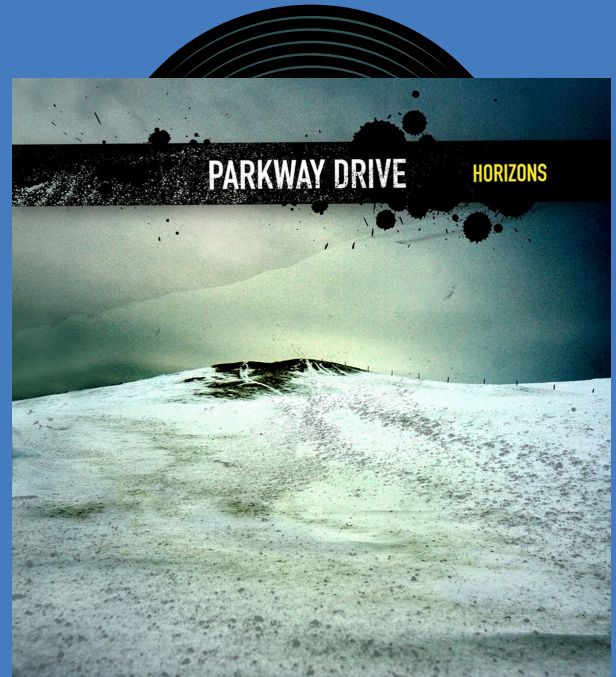

**5) Five Months: 7/10** | Guitar tones carry this band, in all honesty, but this is a good example of much more matured song writing in comparison to the more profane and brash songs of their debut.

**6) Boneyards: 10/10** | Heaviest song spotted! Say what you want about the band's vocalist, but he can do a pretty good death growl. He also has a strange obsession with sharks.

**7) Idols and Anchors: 11/10** | A ballad-sounding metalcore track. Hard to explain, but the guitar harmonies are impressive!

**12) Horizons: 9/10** | A great album closer that has some prog elements to it. 'Nuff said.

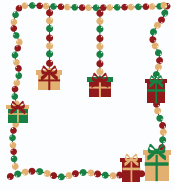

# ARC OF A SCYTHE: BOOK SERIES REVIEW

## Arc Of A Scythe - By Neal Shusterman

The Arc Of A Scythe book series has not 1... not 2... not 3... but 4 books. It is separated into the main trilogy and a small short-story collection of different scythe stories culminating into the final book. The names of the books are Scythe, Thunderhead, The Toll and Gleanings: Short Stories From Arc Of A Scythe. All were created by legendary author Neal Shusterman. These books take place in a futuristic, dystopian Earth where death has been conquered, all (corrupt) governments have been eradicated, and the 'Cloud' has evolved into a sentient being called the Thunderhead.

## Arc Of A Scythe Book 1: Scythe



Two teenagers, Citra and Rowan, who are chosen to apprentice under a Scythe in a future society where humanity has conquered death, disease, and war. The Scythedom is the only entity that can cause "gleaning"—a true death—to control the population, and Citra and Rowan are trained in this grim art. The two are forced to compete, as only one of them can become a Scythe, and the winner will have to glean the loser. This is an amazing book, especially for the start of a series. The language in this book is of an advanced level and the flow of the story is brilliant. I would rate this book as a definite 10/10 and would recommend this book to everyone. However, I would ask that only those aged 12 or 13 and over to read this as those of a younger age would find this a bit too gruesome. Luckily, those reading should be at least 12 or near this age.

## Arc Of A Scythe Book 2: Thunderhead



In a perfect world ruled and guided by the Thunderhead AI, two opposing yet familiar forces emerge into the spotlight: Rowan, a newly-made vigilante seeking out corrupt scythes and ending their path of destruction in fire, and Citra/ Scythe Anastasia, whose compassionate way of gleaning faces threats as corruption spreads. Her unusual scythe ways are met with support with the 'old guard' scythes but the 'new order' threaten to bring her down. This would prove to be significantly important when an old enemy of the MidMerican scythedom arises from the dead to bring the world to its final reckoning.

This book is just as good as the first book if not better. The language and writing could be considered extraordinary to some (especially those 11 or under). Occasionally, there is some mild swearing and I recommend this book to be for the age of 14 or over. Sometimes there also some small sexual references that I would recommend either skipping if you would not like to read them. But overall, the book is amazing. I would not have liked to have discouraged you from reading this as it is so good that I was speechless when I finished it. The twist at the end makes you hope and then make you

want to cry in despair with such empathy. The writing is again that of an expert for some but for others, quite normal but still brilliant. I would rate this an 11/10. It is just too good not to read. I would love to hear anyone's thoughts on this book when they read it.

### Arc Of A Scythe Part 3: The Toll



It has been over two years since Endura sank and the notorious Scythe Lucifer - an unordained, self-proclaimed scythe who ends corrupt scythes by fire (see second line of Thunderhead summary for more information) has disappeared with Scythe Anastasia. Now, a salvage captain and his crew, led by Amazonian Scythe Possuelo, lift up the Vault of Relics and Futures only to find a massive mound of diamonds in the sea and two familiar figures frozen yet alive, huddled together inside the Vault. During the time, Scythe Anastasia was presumed dead, Scythe Goddard declared that *he* was chosen by the Grandslayers to be Midmerica's High Blade in their final moments. Through an immense amount of persuasion (and/or bribing, threatening and empty promises), Goddard was announced Overblade of the Mericas, meaning he controlled the entirety of the Merican scythedom which slowly started to corrupt. However, when Scythe Anastasia finds herself in the company of the SubSaharan scythedom and the welcoming comfort of High Blade Tenkamenin, she unravels the mystery of Goddard's past.

This book is just too good. There is nothing that could match it. It is a great comeback and a great return from the 2<sup>nd</sup> book's twist at the end. The writing was just spectacular, the pacing was amazing and the plot/ storyline was just brilliant. The author really outdid himself in this book. In all books, there is always something that is considered a fault or an error the author had made but not this time. The Toll is just perfect. Nothing I would do to change it. I rate it a 12/10.

### Arc Of A Scythe Part 4: Gleanings - Short Stories From Arc Of A Scythe



*Gleanings* is a collection of short stories by Neal Shusterman that expands the world of the Arc of the Scythe series, offering origin stories, new character perspectives, and deeper dives into different timelines and regions within the futuristic society where Scythes control population, exploring tales of familiar figures like Scythe Curie and Goddard, as well as new ones, revealing more about life under the Thunderhead and the complexities of the Scythedom.

This book is great as you get an insight to the 'behind the scenes' of Scythe and tells a story unique to each and not exactly every scythe. However, this is the worst book in the series. This is due to the fact that some stories are from scythes you have never heard of before and when you read their mini-stories, they feel like strangers. Also, each story is quite dull and boring since they are not very descriptive and quite prolonged. But it does have an even shorter story at the end which has a familiar character and the content of this specific story hits hard to the reader as we feel empathic for the character we lost too soon. I rate this a 7/10.

Overall, this series is amazing and almost nothing can match that, except from a certain more popular series I also love and might review as well. There is absolutely nothing I could do to change this story but for some reason, it's just amazing and surprisingly really pleasing so I absolutely recommend reading this. For all 4 books, I rate the series..... a 9/10. Gleanings let it down with its disappointing content.

# FORMULA 1 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP 2025: THREE-FOR-ALL

Though this article was produced in December 2025, greetings and Happy New Year readers! Hopefully, you've had a restful winter break, and are feeling recharged ahead of the Spring Term! If this is also your first time reading Best of the Beths, then welcome to the newsletter! I am Faeq (**pronounced:** Fi-EEK) of 10B, the editor of BotB as well as a motorsports enthusiast! Those of you that have regularly been reading the newsletter before may have noticed that I'm mainly a NASCAR fan (as evidenced by my content regarding Kyle Larson's Cup Series Championship in November's edition, for example)!

Yet there are also some things that I know about Formula One, which has also been a part of me for a few years now. To change things up a bit, I decided to switch to F1 for this edition, with quite an interesting topic to talk about! Again, it'll be January in 2026 when you first read this, but it'll only be around a month removed from the conclusion of a titanic battle for the 2025 World Drivers' Championship! Featuring McLaren drivers Oscar Piastri and Lando Norris, as well as Red Bull's Max Verstappen, why don't we have a look at how the championship battle unfolded? But first, we need a bit of...

## **\*Background/Context: 2024 F1 Season and 2025 F1 Pre-Season Testing**

In 2024, Max Verstappen continued his recent dominance in the sport by winning a fourth consecutive Drivers' Championship, yet didn't exactly cruise to it. This is because McLaren had been making surges forward to the front of the grid, evidenced by Lando Norris closing Verstappen's early lead and the team winning the Constructors' (Teams') Championship for the first time since 1998. Off the back of such success, McLaren looked strong in 2025 pre-season testing and entered the new season as favourites for both championships, with Verstappen expected to duel with Norris again after a few skirmishes between the pair in 2024!



Once McLaren had a car that could seriously contend for victories in 2024, a series of battles between Lando Norris and Max Verstappen would take place, notable ones including Austria [pictured left], Austin (USA) and Mexico. Verstappen would fend off Norris' championship charge, while McLaren rose ahead of Ferrari and Red Bull for the Constructors' title; things were looking up for the papaya outfit.

### \*2025 Formula 1 World Championship: First Quarter (Rounds 1-6)

The 2025 Formula 1 World Championship commenced down-under in Australia, with Lando Norris edging out Max Verstappen for the win. Norris' McLaren teammate Oscar Piastri was also in contention, but a mistake in the changeable conditions relegated him to P9. The Aussie responded by winning the Chinese Grand Prix the next week, as Max Verstappen beat the two McLarens to victory in Japan. Piastri would then win the Bahrain Grand Prix, before being victorious again in Saudi Arabia (giving him the championship lead). Norris would win the Sprint Race in Miami, but Piastri would see the chequered flag first in the Grand Prix, now establishing a 16-point margin at the top of the standings.



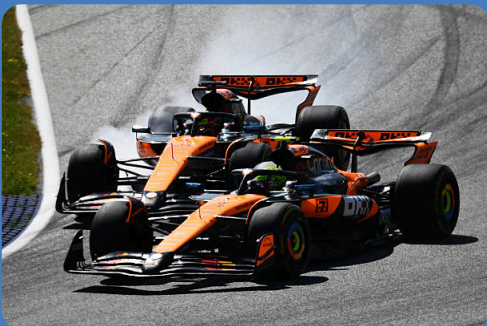
With that, the standings after the first quarter of the season are as follows:

- 1) Oscar Piastri: 131pts [**LEADER**, [pictured right](#)]
- 2) Lando Norris: 115pts [**-16**, [pictured middle](#)]
- 3) Max Verstappen: 99pts [**-32**, [pictured left](#)]

### \*2025 Formula 1 World Championship: Second Quarter (Rounds 7-12)

The second quarter began with a triple-header; Verstappen won at Imola, Norris won his first Monaco Grand Prix the following week, and Piastri took victory again in Barcelona while Verstappen was penalised for a collision with Mercedes' George Russell. Russell won in Canada, with Verstappen in second and the two McLarens **came together** late in the race with Norris having to retire after running into the back of Piastri. The McLarens nearly collided again in Austria, yet kept it clean to finish 1-2 as Norris led Piastri home. Piastri then received a **10-second time penalty** in the British Grand Prix for slowing too much under the Safety Car, opening the door for Norris to win his home race. The two McLarens were now separated by 8 markers, with Verstappen also falling behind...



As the McLarens battled, poor results for Verstappen in Spain (P10) and Austria (a DNF) dropped him further back, with the points looking like this after 12 races:

- 1) Oscar Piastri: 234pts [**LEADER**, [pictured left](#)]
- 2) Lando Norris: 226pts [**-8**, [pictured right](#)]
- 3) Max Verstappen: 165pts [**-69**]

### \*2025 Formula 1 World Championship: Third Quarter (Rounds 13-18)

Having fallen 69 points behind, Verstappen responded by winning the Sprint in Belgium, with Piastri taking the main Grand Prix ahead of Norris. In Hungary, Verstappen had a tricky day down in ninth place, as the two McLarens duelled for the win yet again with Norris emerging triumphant. Now, there would be a three-week intermission (which was the summer break) between the Hungarian and the Dutch Grand Prix, the latter of which would prove to be a key checkpoint in the championship battle. In Zandvoort, Norris suffered a **mechanical failure**, with Piastri winning his seventh Grand Prix of the season and taking a 34-point lead over his teammate; all the while, Verstappen was now 104 points behind in third.



From his furthest championship deficit all year, Verstappen would begin to make a surge as he won the Italian Grand Prix. Meanwhile, there was **controversy** at McLaren as Norris and Piastri swapped positions following a slow stop for the former late in the race. Verstappen went back-to-back at Azerbaijan, with Norris down in P7 and Piastri out of the race following a disastrous opening lap. Controversy presented itself at McLaren **again** in Singapore, with Norris banging wheels with Piastri at the start, though the team would clinch the Constructors' World Championship six races from the end of the season. Up ahead, Verstappen finished second as George Russell won the Singapore Grand Prix.



Ahead of the final quarter of the season, the Drivers' Championship looked like this...

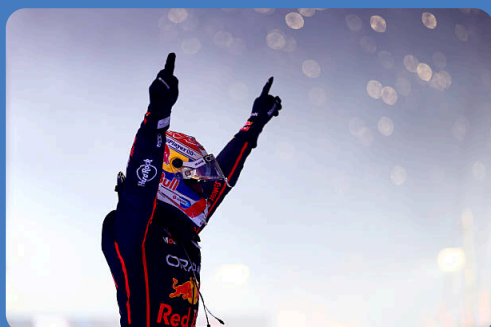
- 1) | Oscar Piastri: 336pts [**LEADER**, pictured right in left image]

### **\*2025 Formula 1 World Championship: Rounds 19-23**

The events of Austin, Texas saw Max Verstappen creep closer with victories in the Sprint (where the McLarens collided **again**) and the Grand Prix. Oscar Piastri still led the Drivers' Championship, but not for much longer as Lando Norris dominated in Mexico to take the top spot away from him before triumphing in both the Sprint and the Grand Prix in Brazil to establish a 24-point margin. Las Vegas was an interesting moment, as Verstappen won the Grand Prix while both McLarens were **disqualified** as the wooden planks on both cars were found to have been worn down to less than the 9mm minimum thickness.

McLaren conceded even **more** points to Verstappen and Red Bull in the Qatar Grand Prix, which was mandatory two-stop race. With the Dutchman having made one of his compulsory pit stops under the Safety Car, McLaren were suddenly on the back foot early in the running. As a result, Verstappen took the victory and now found himself just 12 points behind Lando Norris and four markers ahead of Oscar Piastri in the standings. With that, Norris would now need a podium finish in the season finale in Abu Dhabi regardless of what Verstappen and Piastri did to guarantee his maiden Drivers' title.



Ahead of the season-ending Abu Dhabi Grand Prix, sixteen points separated the top three:

- 1) | Lando Norris: 408pts [**LEADER**]
- 2) | Max Verstappen: 396pts [-12, pictured]
- 3) | Oscar Piastri: 392pts [-16]

## **\*2025 Formula 1 World Championship: Season Finale (Round 24)**

For the first time since 2010, at least three drivers had entered the season finale with a mathematical chance of winning the World Drivers' Championship. Max Verstappen (who was once 104 points behind) was going for his fifth consecutive title, while both McLarens were aiming for their first. Verstappen qualified on pole for the Abu Dhabi Grand Prix with Lando Norris and Oscar Piastri right behind him, the three of them keeping formation on the opening lap until Piastri and Norris swapped positions. Throughout the race, Norris was kept honest by Ferrari's Charles Leclerc and also had a moment while trying to overtake Red Bull's Yuki Tsunoda (who was penalised in an aggressive attempt to block him in order to try and help Verstappen's title hopes).

Verstappen did the most he could by dominating and winning the Abu Dhabi Grand Prix, with Piastri coming home second. But behind them, Lando Norris managed to pull away from Leclerc and maintain the third place he needed to **clinch the 2025 Formula 1 World Drivers' Championship**, winning McLaren's first Drivers' title since 2008 (Lewis Hamilton) and becoming the 35th driver in the history of the sport to accomplish such a feat. Norris ended up winning the championship by a mere **2 points** over Verstappen (the closest margin under the current points system since its introduction in 2010), with teammate Piastri (who led the standings for 15 of the 24 rounds) in 3rd, 13 points back.



After 24 races, there were only 13 points in it between the top three, with the final tallies looking like as follows...

- 1) | Lando Norris: 423pts [**CHAMPION**, in left and right (on right-hand-side) images]
- 2) | Max Verstappen: 421pts [-2, left in right image]
- 3) | Oscar Piastri: 410pts [-13, middle in right image]

## **\*With that, what key moments could (or would) have changed the outcome?**

Now this isn't to discredit Lando Norris, but as you might have been able to tell already, this championship could've gone many ways, especially in favour of either Max Verstappen or Oscar Piastri. Let's start with Piastri, who sat first in the table for **over half** the year but lost some momentum from Azerbaijan where he not only crashed in qualifying, but initially jumped the start before crashing out a few corners later. Not only this, but had he not slid off the road in Australia as well as swapped places with Lando Norris at Monza, there may well have been enough of a net point increase to his actual total in order for him to overhaul his teammate as well as Max Verstappen, who came surging back from over a century of points behind after the summer break.



In terms of Verstappen, had the Monza swap between the McLarens not happened, and everything else stayed the same, he would have completed the best comeback in F1 history for his fifth consecutive World Championship by an even slimmer margin than in actuality... **one point**. Alternatively, we could look at his collision with George Russell in the Spanish Grand Prix; had the Dutchman kept a cooler head, he would have gained 9 points more than if you applied his 10-second time penalty! Nevertheless, it was still an impressive recovery from Verstappen, who ended the year **with 10 successive podium finishes** (including 6 wins) and had to contend with the dominant McLaren MCL39 throughout the season (in which case he did quite well)!



Despite narrowly missing out on the World Championship, it was an excellent season from Piastri, who won 7 Grands Prix after being considered a bit of an outside bet before Round 1. As for Verstappen, he may have missed out on five-in-a-row by 2 points, but the Dutchman mounted a surreal charge from 104 points back with inferior machinery after the Dutch Grand Prix.

With the end of the 2025 Formula One World Championship comes the end of the ground-effect era of the sport (2022 onwards), with new machinery set to come in for the 2026 rendition. As we saw with Mercedes and Lewis Hamilton transitioning from 2021 to 2022, their dominance had faded away as they were surpassed by Red Bull and Ferrari (and of course, eventually McLaren). It is a matter of time as to whether or not we see the same happen to McLaren and Lando Norris, who will still be saying, in some way, "We are number one" throughout 2026 (having won the title, Norris has opted to take the #1 away from Verstappen ahead of the new season)!

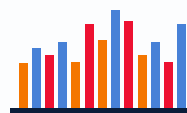

As I said, take this as an **optional bonus** - if you want to skip ahead to the next topic, then you may! For those of you that are interested (such as the F1 fans themselves), not only have I decided to recap the battle for the 2025 Drivers' Championship, but also get in some interesting facts and statistics from the 2025 campaign! Some of these will have come from various points, while others may be based on the very ending of it; still, you'll learn a bit more about 2025's championship contenders, podium finishers from the past season and top drivers of the sport! This kinds of makes up for the lack of F1 content in Best of the Beths as of late, but nevertheless (if you choose to), enjoy, I suppose!



2) | **Max Verstappen (Red Bull):** While Verstappen won the most races (8) for a fifth year running, this time he failed to win the Drivers' Championship; this is the first time since 2016 (Lewis Hamilton) that the winningest driver on the season didn't win the title. His P2 points finish also means he has been deposed as World Champion after 1,457 days.

3) | **Oscar Piastri (McLaren):** Piastri led the championship for 15 rounds while scoring the most wins for an Australian in a Formula One season (7). He also achieved his first Grand Slam at the Dutch Grand Prix (taking pole, victory, the fastest lap and leading every lap), making it the first for a McLaren driver since Mika Hakkinen at Monaco in 1998.

4) | **George Russell (Mercedes):** Russell was the only full-time driver to not have registered a single DNF this year, and he completed all but 2 of the laps overall (he finished two laps down in Monaco, which was the same Grand Prix where he failed to qualify in the top six for the only time all season).

**5) | Charles Leclerc (Ferrari):** Leclerc may have went winless for the fourth time in seven seasons with Ferrari, but he was responsible for all seven of the team's podium finishes. Over the course of the 2025 campaign, he also beat teammate Lewis Hamilton (**below**) 19-5 in qualifying and 18-3 on race day.

**6) | Lewis Hamilton (Ferrari):** For the 2025 season, Hamilton made a surprise switch from Mercedes to Ferrari, F1's most successful outfit. He may have won the Sprint Race in China, but for the first time in his illustrious F1 career, he failed to score a single Grand Prix podium finish throughout the course of a season. In every year prior to 2025 (2007-2024), he stood on the rostrum at least 5 times.

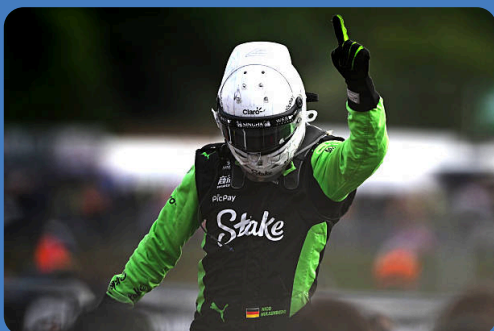
**7) | Andrea Kimi Antonelli (Mercedes):** With a third place finish in Canada, rookie Antonelli became F1's third-youngest driver (at 18 years and 294 days old) to stand on the podium. He also became Italy's first podium finisher since Jarno Trulli back in 2009.

**9) | Carlos Sainz (Williams):** Despite being replaced by Lewis Hamilton at Ferrari, Carlos Sainz made the top 3 twice (Azerbaijan and Qatar). With those two podiums, Sainz became the first Williams driver to register multiple podium finishes in a season since 2015 (both Felipe Massa and Valtteri Bottas).

**11) | Nico Hülkenberg (Kick Sauber):** After fifteen years of trying and frustration, Nico Hülkenberg claimed the first podium of his F1 career in the British Grand Prix, ending a 238-race wait that was also the longest in the history of the sport. At the time, Sauber had jumped from 9th (second-to-last) to 6th in the Constructors' table with the result.

**12) | Isack Hadjar (Racing Bulls):** Hadjar was the other rookie to claim a podium finish, doing so at the Dutch Grand Prix (where he accidentally broke his 3rd place trophy 😊)! He became the youngest French driver to stand on the podium aged 20, giving Racing Bulls their sixth podium in the team's history (they also scored three as Toro Rosso and two as AlphaTauri).

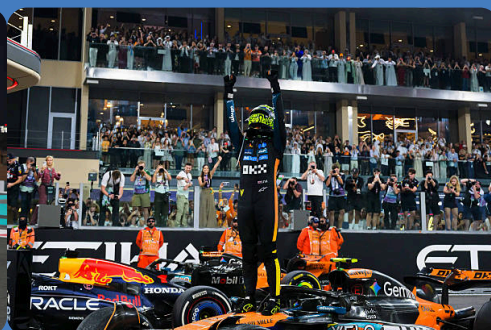
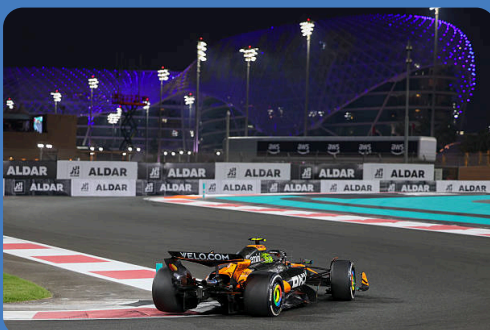
**1) | Lando Norris (McLaren):** Of course I couldn't forget the new World Champion; I just thought it'd be better to save the best for last! With a third place finish in the finale at Abu Dhabi, Lando Norris became one of now 35 drivers to win the Formula One World Drivers' Championship.

**1) | Lando Norris (McLaren):** Norris' Drivers' title was the first for McLaren since 2008 with Lewis Hamilton [right image]. There are actually quite a few striking similarities between these two seasons, including the fact that **both** of them: **1) won the season-opening Australian Grand Prix on March 6th, 2) won the Monaco Grand Prix on May 25th, 3) crashed out in Canada, 4) won the British Grand Prix (their home race), and 5) clinched their first Drivers' Championship (driving for McLaren) at the final round of the season.**

**1) | Lando Norris (McLaren):** Furthermore, Norris became the 11th driver to win the World Championship on behalf of the United Kingdom (who now have 21 overall), and the first new British champion since Jenson Button back in 2009. The title also means that McLaren have completed the Drivers'/Constructors' Championship double in a Formula One season for the first time since 1998.

**| McLaren - Constructors' Champions:** McLaren's dominant campaign in 2025 included seven 1-2 finishes between Norris and Piastri, the team's 200th F1 victory in Hungary [right image], 14 Grand Prix wins (their most in a season during the 21st century), and a 10th Constructors' title that now moves them up to second all-time (behind Ferrari with 16). They finished 2025 with a staggering 833 total points, 364 ahead of nearest rivals Mercedes, 382 in front of Red Bull, and 435 clear of Ferrari.

# PLANE CRASH AT DUBAI AIR SHOW

Good morning, afternoon, or night to you all (depending on when you're reading this!) Today, I'm back to share a relatively recent event with you, one that I think you'll find interesting. So, let's begin!

## **What is the Dubai Airshow?**

The Dubai Airshow is one of the largest air-shows in the world, fifth behind Zhuhai, Berlin, Farnborough and Paris. It is held biennially (every two years) and is held in the city of, well... Dubai. The Dubai Airshow first started in 1986 with the name 'Arab Air', before then taking place in 1989. It was scheduled to occur in January 1991, but was then moved to November due to the Gulf War. The next Airshow took place in 2001, after a 10-year hiatus (that's three times longer than Covid!). It has been taking place biennially since then, and it last took place this year, from the 17<sup>th</sup> to the 21<sup>st</sup> of November.

## **What happened in the crash?**

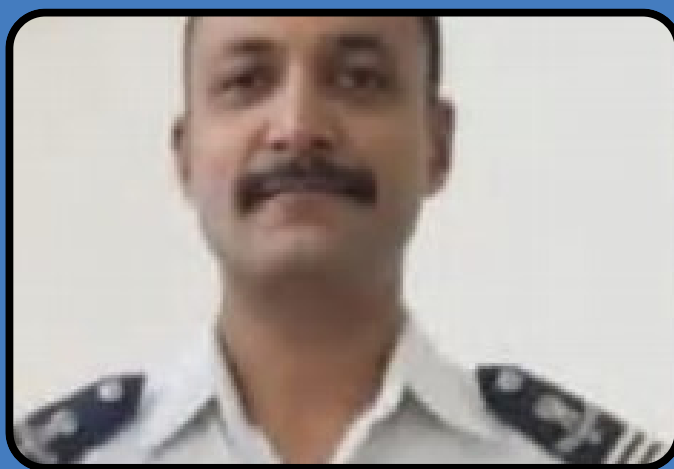
Since about 1982, India has been developing a set of fighter jets dubbed 'HAL Tejas', a lightweight multirole fighter plane designed in an effort to revolutionize the Indian Air Force (IAF), and to gain an upper hand against China and Pakistan. Some time ago, on the final day of the Dubai Airshow (21<sup>st</sup> November), an IAF pilot got ready to show the world Tejas' latest and 'most lightweight and reliable' model - the Mk1. However, unknown even to him, the plane would crash only a few minutes later. Sadly, the pilot sustained fatal injuries during the crash and died, as reported by the IAF. Quite surprisingly, a rumour had surfaced only the day before (the 20<sup>th</sup>) that a Tejas aircraft had experienced an oil leak while at the show, and it is still unclear if the crashed plane was the very one with the leak.

## What was the aftermath and has a Tejas plane crashed before?

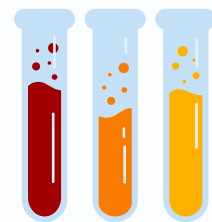
Shortly after the crash, the Indian Air Force released a statement saying they “*deeply regret the loss of life*” and that the IAF “*stands firmly with the bereaved family in this time of grief*”. The Dubai Airshow was paused for half an hour, and after that it was reported that the Russian ‘knights’ were already flying overhead while emergency crews still worked on the crash site, and a diplomatic SUV carrying the Indian flag was also spotted. As of the 3<sup>rd</sup> of December, the reason for the crash is still unknown, however videos of liquid from the aircraft dripping into bags below support the earlier oil leak rumour. Emirati crash investigators are also reported to be, well... investigating the crash (what did you think?). This marks the second (potentially) fatal Tejas crash this decade, the first being over the Indian state of Rajasthan last year. Fortunately, the pilot was able to safely eject before the Rajasthan crash, saving his life, but sadly Namansh Syal (Tejas’ pilot in the Dubai Airshow) didn’t have that chance.

# KINGS COLLEGE LONDON: CHEMISTRY EVENT

Recently I had the pleasure of attending an open event hosted by KCL (King's College London) designed to try and help assess as to whether a course in chemistry is "right for you". The structure of the event was that of an overview of the course at KCL and what to expect by attending the university. Later on, we went to the lab to explore the new apparatus, which would be seldom seen outside of a university, such as Rotary evaporators. As an aspiring chemistry student myself, I was intrigued by the countless opportunities that were presented before me during the event, such that I could learn more about the true world of academia outside of the classroom.

One difference between the way that chemistry is taught at school in contrast to university is the amount of lab time. Normally in school (especially in A-levels) you would be expected to conduct a practical effectively and safely with the given equipment. Unfortunately labs in school are only conducted once every 'blue moon' such that by the time that you reach GCSEs most cannot tell the difference between a burette and a pipette.

In contrast, chemistry at university has a great deal of practical focus, as theoretical chemistry is not much of a large scientific branch (the theoretical side is mainly given to physics). Especially so, as chemicals and molecules don't always follow what you would expect to happen. In fact a common idea within chemistry is that if a rule is broken then the exception has its own rule (seen especially in the Markovnikov rule for halide addition to an algebra for interested sixth formers...).

As a message to all sixth formers, to find an amazing opportunity sometimes only requires you to look at what is around you, as opportunities for aspiring academics, musicians, historians etc. are more abundant and prevalent now than they have ever been. The ability to also network and build connections can be strengthened by attending these events and meeting new people. In the world of work, the most successful often times have the best connections to others, and it is something that the sciences desperately need moving forward into the future. Mainly evidenced by the evolution of Artificial Intelligence, how we communicate with each other will be the most important thing.

For those of you interested in reading more about science and how the world is changing, look out for the Medicine Society newsletter that will be released soon after Christmas, Written by sixth formers, it will give a perspective on how science is influencing the lives that we live.
